After a stark four-bar introduction, the soloist provides a link to the main opening tutti, nearly bars long, contains strong contrasts of material, abrupt modulation in the transition, and a distinct second group in the dominant key, and concludes with a fully orchestrated statement of the opening fanfare in the home key.
